NEW Programs & Services

Young Women's Health and Hematology Clinic

Marshall Obstetrics & Gynecology and Cabell Huntington Hospital offer a monthly Young Women's Health and Hematology Clinic on the second Thursday of each month.

The clinic is exclusively for young women ages 10 to 24 who experience menorrhagia and abnormal vaginal bleeding, and specializes in the diagnosis and treatment of abnormal vaginal bleeding and patient education, including the need for specialized health care in the future, especially during surgery, trauma or childbirth.

Patients have one-stop access during their doctor visit to lab work, ultrasounds and other radiology services, as needed.

Chest Pain Observation Unit

To provide specialized diagnostic care for patients presenting with symptoms of a heart attack, Cabell Huntington Hospital has opened a new 9-bed dedicated Chest Pain Observation Unit.

The new unit is located on the third floor of CHH and is fully staffed with a central telemetry station where cardiac data such as heart rate and rhythm are collected. The unit also works closely with EKG, ECHO and Cardiac Rehab to provide a more comprehensive assessment of patients.

The additional beds will allow the use of evidence-based protocols for chest pain evaluation and treatment. The new unit will deliver care for patients with coronary artery disease while expediting the outpatient observation work-up and release of lower-risk patients with non-cardiac chest pain.

MOMS Program

The Hoops Family Children's Hospital at Cabell Huntington

Hospital has created a program that begins once a mother gives birth and provides comprehensive addiction treatment services that promote bonding between mother and baby.

The MOMS (Maternal Opioid Medication Support) program was developed to provide addiction treatment services to



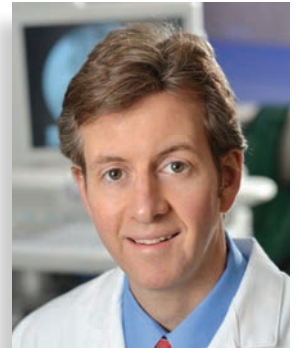
postpartum women, not currently in a treatment program, while their babies are recovering from neonatal abstinence syndrome (a group of problems that occur in newborns exposed to addictive drugs) in the Neonatal Therapy Unit (NTU).

The goal is to provide medication stabilization, psychological and medical treatment, education and training that will create a solid foundation for a healthy, productive life-style that will benefit the mother as well as the family network. This education includes a team of experts who address the specific needs of mothers and offers a range of services from counseling to occupational rehabilitation with a goal to end the cycle of addiction.

Senior Pain & Wellness Center

Marshall Health's new Senior Pain and Wellness Center utilizes the most advanced medical and interventional pain management techniques to diagnose and treat pain conditions in adults 55 and older.

The center emphasizes preventive medicine and focuses on restoring function in senior adults coping with conditions such as chronic back pain, arthritis pain, degenerative disc disease, degenerative joint disease and sciatica. A variety of treatment options are available at the center, including epidural steroid injections, facet nerve blocks, radiofrequency ablation, joint injections, trigger point injections, spinal cord stimulation and more.



The Center is lead by Joseph DeLapa, MD, a fellowship-trained, double board certified interventional pain management physician and anesthesiologist. He has practiced pain management at Cabell Huntington Hospital's Pain Management Center since 2013 and served as president/CEO of the Interventional Pain and Spine Center at Bellefonte, PSC in Ashland, Kentucky, from 2009-2013.

The Marshall Senior Pain and Wellness Center, an outpatient department of Cabell Huntington Hospital, is located in the 20th Street Professional Building at 1115 20th Street in Huntington.

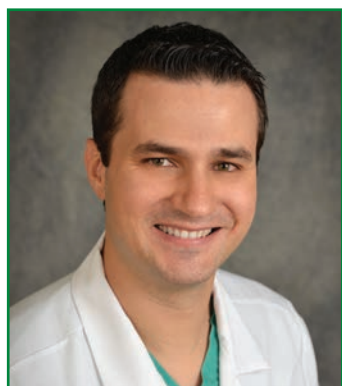

Trauma Kits for Local Law Enforcement

Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH) donated 48 trauma kits to the Cabell County Sheriff's Department to help officers control potentially life-threatening bleeding as a result of various types of medical events they may encounter.



Extensive education and training also have been provided by the hospital to ensure proper use.

The trauma kits contain:

- Quick clot pads – used to rapidly stop severe bleeding
- A tourniquet
- A gauze pack
- A pressure bandage
- Medical gloves

Needle-Resistant Gloves for First Responders

Cabell Huntington Hospital donated \$11,856 to the Cabell County Emergency Medical Technicians, the Cabell County Sheriff's Office and the Huntington Police Department to purchase needle-resistant gloves. The donation allows for the purchase of up to 103 gloves that protect first responders who often deal with overdoses and find syringes while trying to provide care.

CHH Joins Open To All Campaign

Cabell Huntington Hospital joined Marshall University, city leaders and area businesses in a pledge of commitment to promote diversity, equality and inclusion. Open to All is a nationwide campaign to help protect nondiscrimination laws. AHA Mission Lifeline

Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH) has received the American Heart Association's Mission: Lifeline® Heart Attack Receiving Center Accreditation.

The accreditation program — sponsored by the American Heart Association and the Society of Cardiovascular Patient Care — recognizes centers that meet or exceed quality of care measures for people experiencing the most severe type of heart attack, ST-elevation myocardial infarction (STEMI), in which blood flow is completely blocked to a portion of the heart.

RAISE Stroke Award

The National Stroke Association presented Mitzi Beckett, BSN, SCRN, stroke program coordinator at Cabell Huntington Hospital with the Raising Awareness in Stroke Excellence (RAISE) Award for creativity. She was one of only eight recipients in the United States to receive this prestigious honor.



Beckett, who provides stroke education throughout the region, received the award for the creation of *FASTman*, a superhero character used to help educate children about stroke.

FASTman was created to bring fun and excitement to the learning process. He was developed out of the acronym FAST (Face drooping, Arm immobility, Slurred speech and Time to call 911) used to educate what to look for and how to react to an individual suffering from a stroke.



Neurophysiology Lab Accreditation

The Neurophysiology Lab at Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH) has received Laboratory Accreditation status from the American Association of Neuromuscular & Electrodiagnostic Medicine

(AANEM). The Neurophysiology Lab analyzes and monitors nervous system function to promote the effective treatment of neurological diseases and conditions. CHH is one of only two neurophysiology labs in the state of West Virginia to receive this designation.

Cabell Huntington Hospital becomes first hospital in West Virginia to adopt sepsis prediction machine learning algorithm

Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH), is the first hospital in West Virginia to adopt InSight, a machine learning algorithm for sepsis prediction.

Developed by Dascena, Inc., *InSight* analyzes routinely collected data in the electronic health record to forecast sepsis and provide nurses and physicians with several hours of lead time for sepsis treatment. In a recent randomized clinical trial, mortality decreased by 12.4 percentage points with InSight, a relative reduction of 58%. CHH has reduced its sepsis-related in-hospital mortality by 33.5% and its sepsis-related hospital length of stay by 17.1%.



"Because the early clinical diagnosis of sepsis can be challenging and time is so critical, we turned to InSight to assist nurses and physicians with an earlier electronic alerting system. We are already seeing a positive impact for our patients through improved rates of survival," stated Hoyt J. Burdick, MD, senior vice president and chief medical officer.



"We can now be one step ahead in diagnosing and treating sepsis, where hours and minutes can mean the difference between life and death," added Eduardo Pino, MD, Medical Director of the Hoops Family Children's Hospital at CHH.

"Cabell Huntington Hospital has a strong reputation of delivering exceptional quality patient care," said Ritankar Das, chief executive officer of Dascena. "We are excited to work with them on combating sepsis, a life-threatening condition that kills an American nearly every two minutes."

Dascena, Inc. is a science and technology company developing algorithms as predictive biomarkers for complex conditions in inpatient and emergency settings. Our NIH-funded machine learning and clinical research has led to our suite of AlgoDiagnostics™ for predicting acute decompensation, sepsis and acute kidney injury, resulting in several peer-reviewed publications. Providers across the country use our AlgoDiagnostics on tens of thousands of patients per year to make early, accurate, and often life-saving interventions.

Cabell Huntington Hospital Announces expansion of lab services to include toxicology

Cabell Huntington Hospital is expanding lab services to include toxicology for drug screenings, confirmations and secondary analysis using different technology to identify specific drugs, their levels as well as other more minute aspects of the initial drug screening. This is significant not only in providing more timely and precise results, but also allows this important service be provided in West Virginia.

Currently, all drug testing confirmation in West Virginia is outsourced to vendors in a number of states; officials estimate that approximately \$120-\$140 million in health care costs is exported. With the addition of the new laboratory, those health care dollars will stay in the state.

The new toxicology lab, developed in collaboration with Marshall University's nationally recognized Forensics Science Graduate Program will assist tremendously in the region's response to the opioid epidemic by offering a full range of toxicology lab services.

"As a national leader who is addressing the opioid epidemic, we will be able to quickly confirm the presence and level of

substances," said Kevin N. Fowler, president and CEO, Cabell Huntington Hospital. "As a commitment to this important service, we are expanding the lab staff to include toxicology and technicians specifically trained to use highly complex instrumentation which translates to better, more coordinated and timely testing."

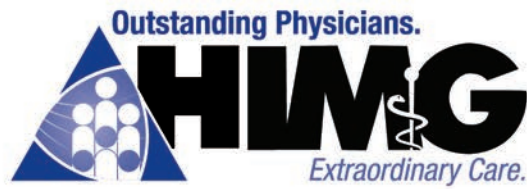


James B. Becker, MD, vice dean for government relations, health care policy & external affairs at the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine and a family medicine physician, said the new laboratory will be very beneficial to physicians, law enforcement and others.

"While we have long provided prompt screening, the addition of this service will dramatically improve the information available to clinicians and reduce the turn-around time on the testing," Becker said. "The service will also support the regional needs of our providers of medication assisted treatment. State-of-the-art technology will enable providers to identify drugs of abuse and also monitor compliance with treatment regimens."

MHC ACO to participate in Medicare Shared Savings Program

Innovative partnership using a quality-driven approach is designed to deliver the right care, in the right place, at the right time



More than 13,500 Tri-State Medicare beneficiaries will benefit from an innovative, highly coordinated, quality-driven approach to care as the MHC Accountable Care Organization began participation in January 2018 in the Medicare Shared Savings Program (MSSP).

Launched by Medicare to advance the Affordable Care Act, the MSSP facilitates coordination and cooperation among providers both to improve the quality of care for Medicare beneficiaries and to reduce unnecessary costs. Its three-part aim is to promote:

- Better care for individuals;
- Better health for the population served; and
- Containment of the growth in health care costs.

In an innovative regional partnership, Marshall Health, Huntington Internal Medicine Group and Cabell Huntington Hospital, Inc., have joined to create MHC Accountable Care Organization, LLC (MHC ACO) to participate in MSSP. As part of the MSSP, MHC ACO, along with Marshall Health, Huntington Internal Medicine Group and Cabell Huntington Hospital will work with other health care providers to ensure that traditional Medicare patients in the Tri-State region attributed to MHC ACO receive the right care, in the right place, at the right time.

“With the number of Medicare patients across the region only continuing to grow, this partnership represents the major health care providers in our region coming together to best care for this vulnerable population,” said Joseph I. Shapiro, M.D., dean of the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine and board chair for its faculty practice plan, Marshall Health. “This initiative is as much about improving and coordinating care as it is a cost-containment measure for the care of our seniors.”

We believe this is a watershed moment within the community as these respective strong organizations work jointly, to improve the health and wellness of our community.”
